


This year's mission trip was very fulfilling for me both mentally and spiritually. It also tested my endurance.

I discovered you can learn a lot about who you are when dealing with 16-18-year-olds. When engaged in real talk with my group of players, I had to be engaged on both the mental and spiritual fronts.

It's amazing how God can allow you the ability to center your attention on what He's doing in your life for you and through you. I went expecting to have a fun week with players. But instead was taught by them. They have something to say.


If I choose to listen to their story, I can share my story and get permission to tell God's story.

I was able to share with young men and women how God loves us and has a purpose and plan for our lives. It's important for us to demonstrate God's love to others who may not know about it.

Through this mission trip experience, I've learned more about being patient and persevering. God has much in

store than we can imagine.

What stood out to me the most was our small group experience. One young woman, Nicole, is 16-years-old and married and seemed confused, but later gave her life to Christ. 20-year-old Franklin was not enrolled in the camp. I met him during skills training on the outdoor court, welcomed him in and later that day, he too gave his life to Christ.





Well, by lunch on Monday, it was clear that God was going to use this week to teach me a whole lot about myself, perhaps much more than I could possibly teach the boys about basketball. I had the green group – 14-year-olds, the group that would become known throughout that week as the "special bunch"! I probably spent 40% of my time actually teaching the game of basketball, while the majority was spent asking kids to listen, disciplining, organizing the kids in lines, etc. We started the camp Monday and by sometime Tuesday, God revealed to me that this week would be little about basketball, but more about pouring into these boys, showing them gentleness, patience and humility, while at the same time challenging them to be the best young men they could be – not really being better in basketball, but in fearing God, and in being stronger young men in their homes, schools and communities, making wise choices, thinking before acting, etc.







There were many great moments throughout the week, including the All Star Night, Movie Night, the banquet and the countless games of knockout we played; but, my favorite was this. Frequently throughout the day, my boys would literally leave the court and go across the street, most often to get a snack. Through Tuesday, they never asked for permission. By Wednesday, they understood they needed to ask since coaches were entrusted with their safety.

Well, during the breaks, rather than think up our next basketball drill, I had started using the time to ask the boys questions, to get to know them and to better understand their family life. Moises, one of my 14-year-olds, and I were talking. He told me there were 11 people who lived in his house including grandparents, cousins, his mom, and siblings. After talking for a while, he asked if he could go across the street. I thanked him for asking and he went. About five minutes later, he came back. I could see he had a snack and thought nothing of it. But then, he did the unexpected.

He went into his pocket and pulled out some cookies, wrapped up, clearly new, and he gave them to me. I opened my hand and received them, but was so taken aback; I don't think I spoke right away. I eventually said thank you and then thank you again. I was so overwhelmed with his generosity that I just sat there in awe. It brought a smile to his face. I couldn't believe that a boy with so little, a boy with so few resources would even think to share his snack with me, let alone use his money to buv me a snack.



Here I am, gainfully employed and having more than enough, and this boy, Moises, buys me a snack. I just couldn't believe it – still can't. Pastor Kurt happened to walk over just a few minutes afterward and I shared what had just happened, and we both just kind of shook our heads in amazement. I am emotional right now thinking about that moment.

Later at Thursday's banquet, Moises and I took a bunch of selfies. I could see we had built some real camaraderie and trust. As a leader of a large organization of people at work, I often reference the Covey quote which says, "People don't care how much you know until they know how much you care". I felt like that moment with Moises, and really the entire week, put special meaning into that statement. Now I have a real life story to show the truthfulness of it.



The community evangelism, community cleanup, repairing of homes and sharing of meals has become the VBS, home repair and meal sharing, basketball camp equipped with skills training, a banquet and daily sharing of the Gospel. This package has provided the passage of saving 33 for Christ.

Out of over 100 young men and young women

who attended the camp from the ages of 7 to 22 years, 33 accepted Christ as their personal Savior. This mind-blowing event has come after four years of patiently showing up and being used by God for His purpose.

I can genuinely say: See how the Lord prepares individuals, teams, and leaders all to accomplish His plan of action for the salvation of the world.

Just imagine me. It all began when an evangelist came to a worship service for our youth in our church and explained to us how we could accept Jesus as our personal Savior. Her explanation was that our lives were dirty like a glass of water, which she showed us, and that Jesus would come along if we so






